

How Do You Sew Your Words?

In preparation for the Williamsburg Book Festival, which has been postponed, I gathered my books and my giveaways into a corner so I wouldn't forget anything. That's when I realized I still hadn't purchased bags for my larger books. I spent several hours researching the purchase of bags in bulk and realized that this poor author couldn't afford it. But a brilliant idea formed. "I could make my own."

With the same determination as Jacques Cousteau finding sea creatures in the deep, I found my sewing machine on a high shelf in the shed, delved deep into drawers for some old material, and found all my sewing accessories.

I discovered that writing is a bit like preparing and then sewing something. First, you have to gather all the ideas which might be pulled out of memories. Characters could be loosely based on friends, family, and other relationships. Secondly, you have to sit down and start writing. Procrastination does not a new story make. As with all things, there are many ways to go about it.

A Planner writes an outline which is like purchasing a pattern. As if they are pinning the pattern to the material, they sketch out the plot and character traits, pinning them to a board. They carefully write details that make sense. Would they use thread that didn't match the material?

The Pantser, a category to which I belong, will start writing as soon as the first idea hits, much like cutting the fabric without using a pattern. The writing has no direction except what comes to mind. This sometimes causes a plot to get stuck in a corner as if the fabric is too uneven and has to be trimmed before sewing the seam. Or even, "gasp," has to be cut anew because the Pantser cut it too small. Pantsters might have to start over from scratch, simply toss the words they sewed, and cut out a new piece of material.

But, even Pantsters might benefit from some ground-

work. A note jotted here and there giving directions for the plot is like ironing the seams before sewing them. There's no measuring and pinning needed, just a quick tap of the iron with a word or two on it. Not a great amount of detail, but enough to keep a Pantser on track.

Both Pantsters and Planners will need to trim when the sewing is done. While the planners may not have as much excess material, they still need to slit corners, trim edges, and turn their words right-side out.

I finished twenty-five bags. Because I eyeballed all the cutting, they are slightly different sizes. Because I ran out of thread, I used different colors. However, once I finished about ten bags, I knew exactly how to proceed and the other fifteen rolled out quickly. In my writing, the words, once written, rearranged and trimmed a few times, finally come together into a finished story.

This is how I sew my words. How do you sew yours?

Christian Pascale approached life with a zeal for adventure, learning, and connecting with others. In his first book, *Memories Are The Stories We Tell Ourselves*, he says in the preface, "I believe that writing is a way of communication with the wider world and a means to transmit something of what we have experienced. Each new experience contributes to who we are, and I would not be who I am without having lived and loved and met such a wide variety of characters."

A graduate of Lafayette College and American University, Chris loved to travel. When he was in his twenties, he lived in France where he taught tennis (which he enjoyed playing throughout his life) while working on his Doctorate in contemporary French history at the Sorbonne. Later in life, Chris worked for the government in a career that would take him to foreign countries where there was great unrest.

A kind and gentle soul, Chris had a quiet sense of humor and an enduring love of family. His pride in his two sons, Raphael and Michel, was evident whenever he spoke of them, and his love for his wife, Liria, was profound. Chris had three published books: *Memories Are The Stories We Tell Ourselves*, *Windows of Heaven*, and *Poetry of Wonder*. His second book of poetry, *Songs in the Night*, will be published posthumously.




*We are all like birds flying about at the birdfeeder


Stan Parson Live at the Library

Buckroe Beach Arts in the Park Festival Success for CBW writers

Have you ever tried to wrestle a ten-foot canopy into place while fighting a strong wind? It's nearly impossible by yourself, so I was happy to have help from a couple of our fellow authors while setting up for the Buckroe Beach Arts in the Park Festival. I understand now why the weights for the canopies are mandatory.

This event is held every year on the Saturday following Labor Day as a fundraiser for the Buckroe Improvement League. Nearly a hundred artists and craftspeople were displaying their wares in booths across the field while a lively DJ spun tunes on the stage.

The weather was still good enough to attract beach lovers for a last weekend of summer, and the wind provided a respite from the heat. CBW funded a booth this year, which was manned by Ted Hale, Jeff Schnader, and Cindy Freeman. There was enough of a crowd to keep us busy most of the day, talking to avid readers and selling enough books to make the day worthwhile.

We also distributed club flyers and may have recruited a few new members. Several prospective authors asked questions about how to get published and put their work out there. We offered the views of both independent and traditionally published authors.

Fellow CBW members, Caterina Novelliere and Davidson Lee Price, were also in attendance in their own booths and reported doing well. Caterina said it was the best she had done in book sales out of the various one day events she attended in 2022. Davidson Lee Price said that he sold more books this year than last year.

We originally had six authors signed up for the booth, but that fell to only three by the day of the festival, which was a good thing. A ten-foot booth can barely hold three authors and their displays. If there is interest next year, CBW may consider buying space for two booths.

How to Write Your Own Book Launch Press Release

Writers who have been raised not to “blow their own horn” may find it difficult to promote their work. Sending a press release to the local newspaper for a book launch feels too much like bragging. Unfortunately, Grandma is not going to do it for you, so here’s what you need to know.

First, what are your local newspapers? The best way to find out is to check the grocery store newsstands. Searching online is less reliable, because some traditional local newspapers don’t have an online presence. When I searched for papers near Kilmarnock, VA, I found the Rappahannock Record and newsontheneck.com, which contained archives and news for three newspapers. I couldn’t tell from the website whether they are still in print. Information on how to submit news is usually found at the bottom of the website home page or in the front section of the printed newspaper.

Once you have found your newspaper, you can create your press release. Pretend that Grandma is writing it and use third person (he or she). Remember the 5 Ws: Who, What, When Where, and Why. According to blurb.com, a traditional book press release is between 300 to 500 words and is ideally one page. Here’s a sample outline:

Contact Info: Include your name, address, phone number, email, and website.

Publication Date: Use “For release on [date]” or simply note “For immediate release.”

Headline: Keep it short and factual. The editor may change it.

CITY, STATE, Date: The city and state should be in all caps.

Body content by paragraph:

1. Introduce yourself and your book in a compelling way. The first sentence should contain launch event details (date, time, location, contact info).
2. Briefly describe the book and its audience.
3. Include an endorsement of the book if you have one.
4. List where to buy the book and repeat launch event details.
5. Closing/Bio: Finish with a short author bio.

Cover Photo: blurb.com suggests adding a high-resolution photo of the book cover. In my experience, small local papers are more likely to publish an informal photo of you holding your book or doing something interesting.

Depending on the host for your launch, you may also be responsible for posting the event date on various online calendars. But that’s another story.

What to Write and How to Write It

To make an impact with your text, make the most of the limited word count and attention spans on social media. Follow these six text-writing tips to get the click-through rate that will grow your business and connect you with customers who are looking for what you offer.

1. Outline your text ad first by writing out some keywords and phrases that your ideal audience relates to. No need to get specific on what you name your products or what your company offers. Use the words that your customer would use to describe the reason they spend money on your products.
2. Make your first 4—5 words about the solution or positive experience you provide. This may be the perfect spot to put your Unique Selling Proposition (USP).
3. Fill up the word count with benefit-driven words. How do your products and services benefit your customers? Work in those words and phrases your target market would relate to.
4. Be very concise with your wording. Make your sentences simple so others grasp the concept of your message quickly and easily.
5. Use direct command words to tell the viewer what to do when they get to the landing page from the ad: browse, download, sign up, explore, review, etc.
6. The message shared in your ad should be consistent with the message viewers will get when they go to the link provided. The landing page is where you want to expand on the message in the text ad, share a few highlights about your products, and ideally offer them something for free in exchange for their email address. There's nothing wrong with offering them a good price on your products either when that fits with the message of your ad.

Your web landing page

This page, which is the first impression the majority of visitors will have of your company, should be designed:

1. to be aesthetically pleasing to your target audience
2. to have very little in the way of sidebars and other distractions
3. to be optimized for search engines;
4. to include brief, compelling highlights of other parts of your website

Words to Ponder

“Antidisestablishmentarianism”: (the longest word in the English language)

Opposition to the disestablishment of the Church of England

It was an organized effort in 19th century Britain to advocate that a state Church (the “established church”) should continue to receive government subsidies and patronage, rather than be ‘disestablished’. The Liberal Party wanted to remove the Church of England as the official Church of England, Ireland, and Wales.

The effort failed in England. However, in Ireland the Church was ‘disestablished’ in 1871 and replaced with the Anglican Church of Ireland. In Wales, four Church of England dioceses were ‘disestablished’ in 1920 and became the Church of Wales. In Colonial America the Church of England was ‘disestablished’ in 6 colonies in the 1780s and the ministers became Episcopalians.

“a” (One of the two shortest words in the English language. It is a shortened form of ‘an’ in mid-14th century England, to make it easier to produce words when the next word begins with a consonant.

“I” (the other shortest word in the English language) In mid-12th century northern England, it became a shortened form of the Old Frisian *ik* and German *ich*.

Book Reviews in Chesapeake *Style*

The purpose of a good book review is to inform the potential book reader of what the book is about so that they can decide whether to buy the book. When you find someone to read and review your book, please share this page with them. Books in *Style* reviews must be original to Chesapeake *Style*.

Characteristics of a good review

Convey the content of the book, not chapter by chapter so much as the entire book.

Provide a description of the way the author approaches the book's topic.

Add flavor to the review by including pungent or revealing quotations from the book or notable facts or findings.

If the book is a collection of essays, or chapters, give some idea of the overall theme and content, but be free to focus on specific chapters the reviewer considers significant or worthwhile.

Be specific. Give details. Try not to be too abstract or vague (e.g., avoid writing "interesting observations," "lots of arresting data," or "a strange view of campus design" unless you complement this with specific examples).

Write the review about the book and its contribution to the subject, not about your feelings on having read the book.

Do not tell the author what book you feel they should have written. Your appraisal is valuable, but this should be quite secondary. The finest reviews are extraordinarily understanding and moderately generous, (but not uncritical), and they are enlightening little 500-word essays in their own right.

There is no substitute for a careful reading of the book itself.

Please keep the review to @ 500 words. We need a clear high resolution copy of the front cover.

Include contact info: location of the writer, phone number(s), email, Facebook, website. Is the book available online, if so, where? Brevity is a virtue.


I'll Get By

The choices the women in her family made alter Jane's outlook on love and life, but she learns that ultimately, strong women survive and love is cultivated in unexpected places.




Life in Haiku

Can she escape her dark fate? Or, will hers be the next body found?




Surprise

The Murder of Angela Dales: Twenty-One Years Later

When the mother of my oldest grandchild was murdered over twenty years ago, I never, in my wildest dreams, thought our

tragedy would be the beginning of a series of national tragedies—an epidemic of gun violence. I never envisioned that Virginia would be the site of this country's worst school shooting on April 16, 2007, leaving thirty-two dead and at least seventeen wounded.

I never imagined that I would be sitting on the Governor's Commission to Investigate the Virginia Beach Mass Shooting of May 31, 2019, that left twelve dead and four wounded, or that, during my time on the panel, there would be other school shootings: one at Bridgewater College in Bridgewater, Virginia and the other at an elementary school in Uvalde, Texas.


I wrote the first edition of this book, thinking perhaps my words could help prevent other families from experiencing the anguish and pain my family had experienced.

When Sidney Lake learned the author's copy of Anne Brontë's novel *The Tenant of Wildfell Hall* had been stolen, he firmly believed



He wrote many short stories but I found a website by Robert Giordano, that has a list of his poems. It's very interesting to read them and takes no time at all. <https://poestories.com/poetry.php>

#OctPoWriMo

Does writing 50,000 words in November sound too difficult? How about writing a poem a day in October? I began participating in #OctPoWriMo in 2019 as a warm-up for my second year of National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo). Unlike NaPoWriMo, #OctPoWriMo is an informal movement identified only by a hashtag.

According to Oxford English Dictionary, a hashtag as “a word or phrase with the symbol # in front of it, used on social media websites and apps to search for all messages with the same subject.”

I like the idea of a poem a day because it can be short. However, I take much longer writing and perfecting a poem than I would with fiction of the same length. Still, if I establish the habit of writing daily in October, it gives me a head start for November. In case I can't think of a topic, here are many lists of prompts available online.

When thinking of short poetry, people usually begin with Japanese forms such as Haiku (3 lines) and Tanka (5 lines). The website “owlcation.com” mentions 14 others. One is the Italian Rispetto, two rhyme quatrains (4 lines) with strict meter of iambic tetrameter (a line of four beats, alternating unstressed with stressed syllables). The rhyme scheme is abab ccdd. I probably wouldn't attempt this one because I find both meter and rhyme difficult.

The Triolet is an eight-line stanza having just two rhymes and repeating the first line as the fourth and seventh lines, and the second line as the eighth. Again, this one is too complicated for me.

I recently wrote a Pantoum, but only because I found an online generator that organized it. This Malaysian verse form has 4-line stanzas and a repeating pattern.

There is also a generator for writing a Villanelle, a French form. “Do Not Go Gentle into That Good Night” by Dylan Thomas is an example. It has five 3-line stanzas. The first and third lines of the first stanza repeat alternately in the following stanzas and form the final couplet in the last quatrain.

The 9-line Nonet poem is more my speed. The first line has 9 syllables, decreasing with each line until the last 1-syllable line. I used to count syllables on my fingers, but now I use syllablecounter.net.

According to the blog “Radio, Rhythm and Rhyme,” Dr. N Gopi, one of India's foremost poets, created a relatively new form called Naani. This 4-line poem usually contains a total of 20-25 syllables and addresses emotions, relationships, and the human condition. I think I could probably write one of those.


If all of these poetic forms still seem too complicated, you may want to imitate the shortest poem ever written. Strickland Gillilan composed “Lines on the Antiquity of Microbes,” also known as “Fleas,” in the early 20th century. The poem reads in full:

Adam
Had 'em.
