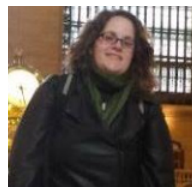

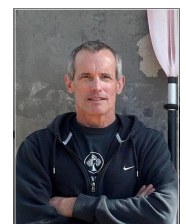

A Message from our President



So here's the thing... People think that being a "writer" is easy. It's a replacement job or a reason not to get a real job. My absolute favorite is when people start elevator pitching you with their idea for your next best-seller. Yikes!! I don't know about the rest of you, but the worst part about being a writer is that I have a hard time concentrating enough to meet my deadlines. There's work, family, bills, pets, and (let's not forget) sleep. Now that you know that about me, my question to you is, how do you work on getting your brain to calm enough to write?

I am what has been dubbed as a "pants'er", meaning that I write by the seat of my pants. I have all my stories in my head (sometimes a couple too many). I just need to find the time to sit down and write everything out.

During the winter, I take the time to travel up to Norfolk to the Muse Writing Center. I pack a lunch and sit in one of their quiet rooms for a while. Though I do get a significant amount of writing done, I have to force myself to make the drive up there. During the summer, with my work schedule, I get little to no writing done. It's sad but true. And since my deadlines are generally November, December, and January, that leaves me September to write and October to get everything out to my critique and BETA editors.

While I was at the Romance Writers of America National Conference in Denver, a fellow Virginia writer and I started talking. She suggested not to give myself a daily goal. Most writers make a goal of a thousand or fifteen hundred words a day or set a weekly goal instead. She said that she would rather sit down without the pressure of a goal and just let the story take her where it needs to go. Even just writing an additional sentence makes her feel like she accomplished something, because every word that is written down gets you one step closer to the inevitable the end.

Since then, I feel more accepting when I don't write. I'm okay with it, because I know that when I am writing, I'm writing because I want to, because I have the time too, because that story is flowing so well in my head that I have to get it on paper. My original goal was to write five thousand words a day: now my goal is zero words per day. Without that mental pressure, even now during the summer, I have written more in the past month than I ever did over last month.

It might be a placebo effect, but it was great advice.

Find your inspiration not in the upcoming deadline, but in your work, in your readers, and in yourself. All of us are writers: you just need to write.

I hope to see everyone at our September workshop in Yorktown! Have a fantastic rest of the summer and Happy Labor Day.

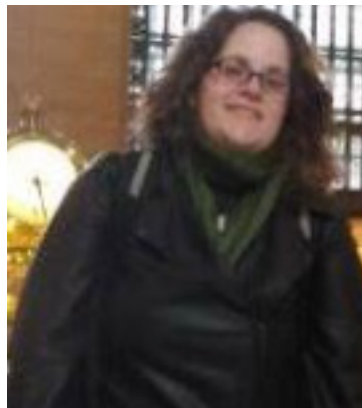
Mary Ann Bauman

Dr. Richard Wenzel - Author, physician, microbe stalker



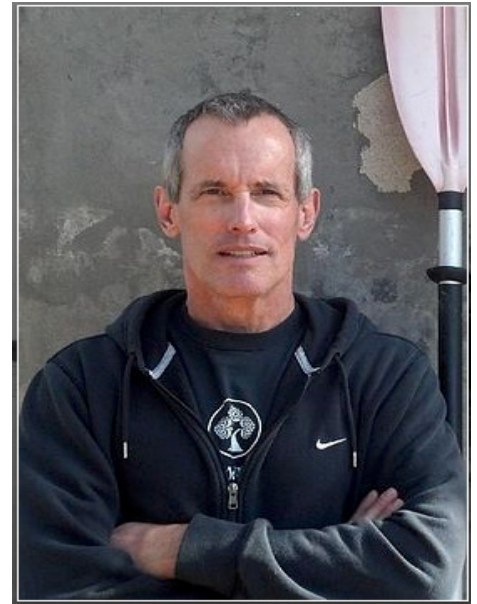
Richard Wenzel, MD, MSc, is emeritus Chairman and Professor of the Department of Internal Medicine at Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) Medical Center in Richmond, VA, and former President of the Medical College of Virginia (MCV) Physicians, a clinical practice for more than 600 physicians. These posts reflect the dual paths of Wenzel's career in medicine: research-driven exploration of infectious microbes and the thoughtful treatment of the people they

*impact. Wenzel now pursues the volatile intersection of these two worlds in his medical thriller book series, *Terror Trifecta*, which follows the work of three renowned experts – microbiology professor Chris Rose, Jake Evans, an American infectious disease specialist, and Elizabeth Foster, a senior agent with M15 – who meet at ground zero of some of the world's most complex terror plots. He is the author of over 500 scientific publications and since 2001, the Editor-at-Large of *The New England Journal of Medicine*.*

*Born in Philadelphia, Wenzel earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Haverford College, in Haverford, PA, an MD from Jefferson Medical College, now Thomas Jefferson University, in Philadelphia, and an MSc from the University of London at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (Epidemiology). He started his career as a resident and then fellow in internal medicine and infectious diseases at the University of Maryland Hospital in Baltimore. Following a stint with the U.S. Navy Reserve as Lt. Commander in the Virology Division, Wenzel held medical and teaching leadership positions at the University of Virginia, the University of Iowa and Virginia Commonwealth University, where he remains active in teaching. Wenzel has served as a consultant to the U.S. Congress and the National Institutes of Health. He is former President of the International Society for Infectious Diseases, currently Editor-at-Large of *The New England Journal of Medicine* and an invited keynote lecturer to conferences around the world. He was recently awarded the Presidential Medallion from VCU for his contributions, talent, leadership, and vision and the Simon Gratz Award from the Jefferson Medical College for significant medical research initiatives. In 2010, Wenzel received the prestigious Maxwell Finland Award from the National Foundation for Infectious Diseases for Scientific Achievement. Previous awardees include former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop and Nobel Laureate Joshua Lederberg. The author of numerous medical textbooks and works of non-fiction, Wenzel now combines his expertise in microbial behavior with plots of international intrigue. Inspired in part by a meeting with Ken Alibek, a former Soviet physician, microbiologist and biological warfare expert, Wenzel writes complex, plausible stories based on combining evil intent with the power of the invisible world.*

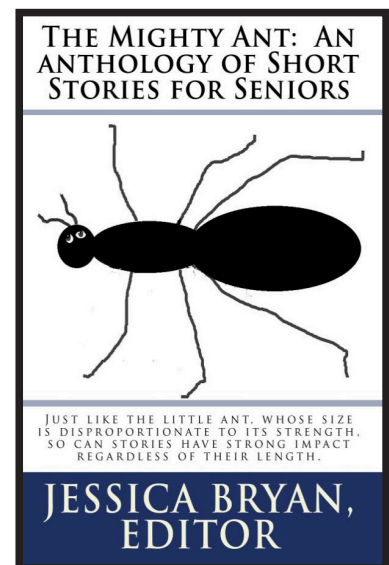
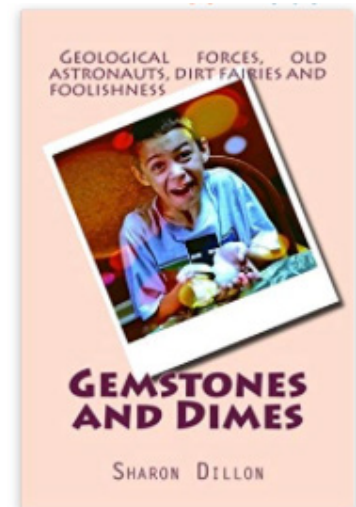
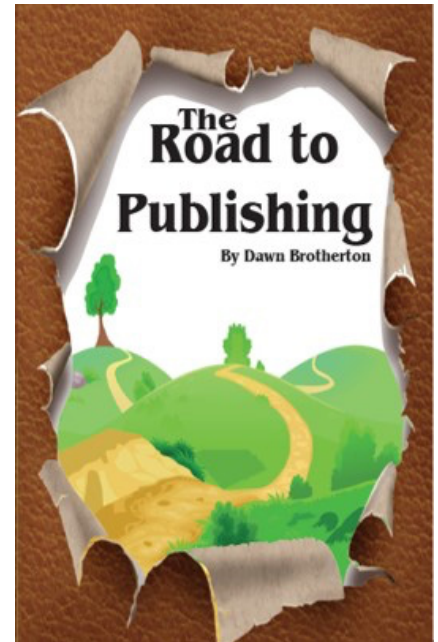
David Cariens: I participated in the Gloucester Book Festival on June 21st. A month later, on July 21st, Dave gave a talk to the Northumberland Democrats about his three books on school shootings and gun violence, this talk followed a presentation in June on the same subject to the Rappahannock Indivisible movement. In late July Dave signed a multi-year, six-figure contract with a major U.S. company to design and teach a series of writing courses. On August 11th, Dave completed the draft of his memoir, *Escaping Madness*, and submitted it to High Tide Publications for an expected November 2019 publication. Gwen Keane will join Dave in giving a talk on memoir writing at the Shepard's Center for Continuing Education in Richmond on November 1st and then again on November 26th at the University of Richmond's Osher Institute.

Cindy L. Freeman is excited to launch her third novel this month with High Tide Publications. *I Want to Go Home* follows the Jordan family of James City County, Virginia on their journey from middle-class comfort to homelessness. Twenty-eight-year-old Abigail (Abby) Jordan tells this story as a memoir. Her journey begins when she is fifteen and learns that her father, Terry, is dying. With ambitious college and career aspirations, she assumes her family is financially solid, that her mother, Elizabeth, will keep her and her two younger brothers, Pete and Joey, safe and secure after their father's death. But that's not what happens. Instead, at seventeen, Abby finds herself responsible for her younger brothers as they run away to Washington, DC, leaving all that is familiar. *I Want to Go Home* is a coming-of-age story about hardship, fear, and isolation. Most importantly, it is a journey of life-affirming survival as Abby is compelled to make adult decisions, and through hardship, awakens to an awareness of God's grace and mercy.

Roger Gosden is contracted with Oxford University Press trade books for ***Let There Be Life***, a biography of the Father of IVF, Robert Edwards. It is the history of a medical breakthrough with elements of memoir. Edwards was Roger's mentor and Roger's wife was the embryologist for America's first IVF baby in 1981.
